




Explore Black History in Seattle's Parks

Suggested Activities

In-person: spend some time **observing and sketching** what you see. What features does this park have? What are people doing? Is there anything in the park that is inspired by, represents, or teaches you about the person it is named after (murals, markers/signs, sculptures, etc.)?

If you were to **design a park** that honors someone – who would it be and why? What would it look like? Draw your design and share it with someone!

Discuss with your friends/family – why do we name parks or places after people? How are parks dedicated to historical figures different than honoring someone with a monument or statue?
